Order of Worship

Fifth Sunday after the Epiphany February 5, 2023

Call to worship (Psalm 27:1)

Leader: We are called to the work of Israel, to the work of Jesus.

People: We are called to spread God's love in this world.

Leader: We can do this work, as we are, because of the Holy Spirit.

People: By God's grace, we are salt.

Leader: We purify, we cleanse, we bind, we bring out the best in people.

People: By God's grace, we are light.

Leader: We allow things to be seen as they are. We point to holiness. People: By God's grace, we follow the commandments and the law.

Leader: We love the Lord our God and our neighbors as ourselves.

People: By God's grace, we are salt. We are light. God transforms us and uses us.

Leader: Let us worship our God, so full of transformative grace.

Call to confession

In worship, everyone is welcome as they are. We invite each other to set our burdens down, including the burden of false pretenses. Let us be honest with God and with our selves about the ways that we fail so that we can hear the good news of Jesus' redemption anew. Let us confess our sins together and individually.

Prayer of confession



Affirmation of faith (The Confession of Belhar)

All-knowing God, you know us our deepest, truest selves and so you know the prayer requests we carry. But the miracle of prayer is that there is something in the naming of our needs and worries and pain that connects us to you.
